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Public Transport

Inside Brussels

The public transport inside of Brussels is managed by STIB/Mivb, which provides busses, trams and metros. These are the easiest way to navigate Brussels itself and drive at regular intervals. Vending machines can be found in each metro station and on some of the tram stops. I suggest getting a card that you can use for 10 rides. You can hop between different transports within the time span of 1 hour for free. Be aware that you sometimes need to use your ticket to exit a station as well, so do not throw it away after you have used it. If no vending machine is nearby you need to get a ticket when you get on the tram or bus by talking to the driver. Do note that he may only speak French.

Stops are announced by voice or by means of a screen, so you should not have too much difficulty knowing where you have to get off.

Metro

The fastest way to get around in Brussels is the metro. You have two main lines: Lines 1&5 and 2&6. You can switch between the two of them at Kunstwet/Art-loi. The event location is located near stop Yser on lines 2&6. Do note that the plan also depicts a connection between South Station and North Station, but this is not a metro connection and I suggest taking the metro to go from South Station to the event location.

The rest of Belgium

You have a bus company 'De Lijn' which provides busses for Flanders (the Northern part of Belgium) and TEC, which provides busses for the Walloons (the Northern part). Some busses of these companies also have stops in Brussels, but are normally not used to travel inside of Brussels.

The best way to visit the rest of Belgium would be by using the train. Brussels has three major stations: Brussels North (Gare du Nord), Central Station (Gare Centrale) and South Station (Gare Midi). Both central station and south station have a metro stop as well so are easily reached. Brussels North is accessible via Tram. The trains are known to have delays, so if you have a tight connection you may want to look up later trains as well.

Event Location

The event takes place at 'Tour & Taxis'. It is easily reached by public transport, and you have a plethora of bus/metro/train stops in the near vicinity. The easiest for people having a hotel in somewhere in Brussels would be the metro (Stop Yser). For people coming by train the North Station / Gare du Nord is the closest stop within walking distance. People coming directly from Brussels National Airport should take the train to Brussels, which stops in Brussels North. The trainride itself only takes around 15minutes, and the trains ride at regular intervals. People coming from Brussels South / Charlerloi need to take a shuttle bus to Brussels South / Gare Midi and can then take the Metro line 2 or 6 to the event location. The bus trip takes around 1hour, and the metro should take around 10 minutes.



Getting to Belgium

Airplane

You have two large airports in Belgium. Brussels and Brussels South. Brussels is the largest one, and should be the airport the 'large' companies fly to. Brussels airport is situated in Zaventem, while Brussels South is situated in Charlerloi in the Southern part of Belgium. This is the main airport Ryanair flies to (although they recently started flying to Brussels as well). Both airports require additional transport to get to Brussels itself.

For Zaventem there is a train station situated inside the airport that has trains going to Brussels. You can look up your train on the belgian rail website. Use stations 'Brussels Airport' and 'Brussel-noord' as start and stop. Trains drive at frequent intervals and should get you in Brussels in 15minutes. Getting from Brussels North to the airport can be done using the airport express train, which is

announced in Dutch, French, English and German.

For Charlerloi there is a shuttle bus that drives every 30minutes, which stops in Brussels South Station / Gare du midi. This station has plenty of metro and tram connections to go to different parts of the city. The bustrip itself should take around 1 hour.

Train

We have a Thalys and Eurostar connection that stops in Brussels South station / Gare du midi. People coming from neighbouring countries that do not want to fly can use this to get to Brussels. IC trains are available as well, although it would be best to check your national railways for a ticket. Do note that the Belgian railways (and thus not Thalys etc.) are renowned to have delays, so if you have a connecting flight be sure to take this into account.

Tips for Safety

Brussels has, like any large city, good and bad parts. The city center itself is quite safe, and you should not run into any problems. Some of the outskirts of Brussels are less nice, but there is nothing of relevance there so you should not wind up there. You may get bothered by some people trying to sell you crap, but as long as you ignore them and keep on walking you should be fine.

Be careful of our beer as they are quite strong when you are not accustomed to them. Be sure not to go out by yourself so you have someone to drop you off safely at your hotel. Worst case get yourself a taxi, and dont wander around drunk in the city. It is easy to get lost in the many small streets in Brussels.

You have a red-light district next to Brussels North station (which is the closest train station to the event location). The surrounding neighbourhood is not that nice, and although I personally never had any issues you would rather not walk alone there at night.

Local Game Store

Brussels weirdly enough only has 1 large store that provides regular games. Outpost Brussels is located on walking distance from Central Station (train/metro), Park (metro) or Madoux (metro). They have drafts on Tuesday and Wednesday, starting at 19:30. The drafts are a rare-keep, so you keep whatever you draft. They also have FNM in different formats, starting at 19:30 and 23:00.

Food and Drink

Brussels is neither expensive nor cheap. You'll pay around 2€ for a drink in a pub.

Ther's a lot of really cool places to eat. Unfortunately, the ProTour site is a neighborhood where you won't find much.



Ninja House (Rue de la Vierge Noire 16, 1000 Brussels): in the center of Brussels, this all-you-can-eat buffet restaurant will satisfy a lot of different people, as you can eat sushis but also beef teriyaki of crispy chicken (don't miss on that one) for a reasonable price (25 € without the drink).

To go: take the subway 1/5 till De Brouckère or St-Catherine station, then it's a 5 minute walk.

Met Jeannine (avenue d'Auderghem 152, 1040 Brussels) :

A little bit excentred, this meat restaurant is reknowned for its all-you-can-eat fondue bourguignonne but you should also try the Lamb brochette (400 gr.), and ther's mussels or salad for the ones who don't like meat. It's around 20€ for the meal.

To go: Subway 1/5 till Schuman, then, it's a 10 minutes walk.

To go: Subway 1/5 till De Brouckère, then a 10 minutes

walk.

Aux Armes de Bruxelles (rue des Bouchers 13, 1000 Brussels):

This classy restaurant is located in the historic center of the city, next to the famous "Grand Place". Surrounded by a lot of awful touristic restaurants, this is nearly the only good one in that neighborhood. It's classy and but quite expensive, the waiters are suited, and you'd better book a table.

To go: Subway 1/5 till Central Station, then walk 5 minutes.

Restobières (rue des Renards 9, 1000 Brussels):

Home of Alain Fayt, this small cosy restaurant breathes Brussels. Located in the polular neighborhood "Les Marolles", next to the old market from la Place du Jeu de Balle. The cook will prepare all his meals with famous Belgian beers. You can obviously order these on the menu as well. There's always a little song from Jacques Brel played and the decoration is made of old coffee grinders and old cookie boxes with the picture of the former royal couple.

To go: Subway 2/6 till Porte de Hal, then a 5 minutes walk.

Le Zinneke (Place de la Patrie 26, 1030 Brussels):

This restaurant is speialised in one Belgium's cooking specialties: mussels. You can choose between 50 different preparations, the size of the mussels and the size of your meal.

To go: Tramway 25/62 till Patrie and you're arrived.

Belgium is a reknowned beer country, so you have obviously a lot of really cool places to get a drink.



La Porte Noire (rue des Alexiens 67, 1000 Brussels) :

Located in in former covent (you can still see the well), this pub has a selection of 200 (mostly) Belgian Beers. If you're lucky, they will be a concert in the pub (mostly rock/celtic music). They also have a good selection of fine whiskies for the connoisseurs.

To go: Subway 1/5 till Central Station.

The bar is always full, so don't expect to be able to sit, and the bartenders won't have a lot of time to advice you. Next to the pub is the Floris, famous for having a cool selection of Absynth.

To go: Subway 1/5 till De Brouckère then a small 10 minutes walk.
