Travel Information

Note on traveling by train

Every time you travel by train, you have to pay a €1 surcharge for a throw-away travel card (OV Chipkaart). If you plan on staying in the Netherlands a bit longer, or to come back in the future, it may be worth your while to buy a reusable *OV Chipkaart* which costs €7,50. You can top up your card afterwards. This card is valid for 5 years and can be used on all public transport throughout the Netherlands. Every time you travel by train you have to check in at the station of departure and check out at your final destination. When you switch trains, you do not have to check in/out, but when you switch modes of transportations (e.g. train to bus), you do.

From Amsterdam Airport Schiphol

The easiest way to get to the venue from the airport is by train. At **Amsterdam Airport Schiphol** you can take a "Sprinter" train (5735, destination Utrecht) for two stops that should take about **10 minutes** in total. You should get out at **Amsterdam RAI**. The venue is located at walking distance (7 min) to the north. Tickets for the train are €3 in second class and €5.10 in first class. Be aware that there is a €1 **surcharge** if you don't have an *OV Chipkaart*.

Alternatively, you could take a **taxi** from the airport to the venue. This would cost you somewhere around **€30-35**. Services like **Uber** should also be available at a slightly lower price.

By car

Arriving by car should be fairly easy. The Amsterdam RAI is located just inside the **A10 southern** ring road of Amsterdam. Extensive parking facilities cater for over 5000 cars - and they generally cost €15 per day for exhibition visitors.

By Bus

Going by bus is not recommended as it is much easier to get there by train. In case there is a problem with the train line or some unusual delay, it is still possible to get to the venue by bus though. First, get the bus number **310** to **Station Zuid Amsterdam**. From there, you can get bus number **65** (KNSM Eiland) and get off at **Amsterdam**, **Scheldeplein**. It is then a 3 minute walk to the venue. The bus comes every 15 minutes and the full trip takes around 50 minutes.

Hotels

Hotels in Amsterdam are quite **expensive**. Here are some options within **walking distance**.

Budget options

Amsterdam has plenty of hostels with beds in a dormitory room that are significantly **cheaper** than most hotels. Here are some options close to the tournament venue:

However, (almost) all hotels in Amsterdam are crazy expensive so if you are looking for a better alternative, you'll be just fine by looking for a hotel in Utrecht, Haarlem or Leiden near a train station or in Amstelveen near a metro stop. The venue is within a 10 minute walk from Amsterdam RAI.

Sightseeing

Taxi and public transport

You can grab a **taxi** to get around Amsterdam. Some people (mostly taxi drivers) would even recommend it. We would like to make a stand and say "**Don't do it**." Amsterdam taxi drivers are known for their general lack of customer service, rude behaviour, questionable knowledge of the Amsterdam street names and inventive shortest path algorithms.

Public transport is usually **faster**, definitely **cheaper** and about as safe as a taxi. If you're going to be using public transport more than three times a day, get a 24- or 48- or 72-hour public transport card from the Tickets & Info stand at the Central Station.

There's also the **I Amsterdam card** which costs a lot of money, but certainly has value if you're planning to spend a day as a tourist. Prices for that one start at €57 and you can find more information here: http://www.iamsterdamcard.com/

Bicycle

The main way to get around Amsterdam is, of course, by bicycle. You will find a lot of **bicycle rentals** in the city and they will cost you somewhere around €10 per day. The most practical is probably MacBike, which has various locations in Amsterdam, including the Central Station. More info about this can be found at http://www.macbike.nl

What to do in Amsterdam?

Amsterdam is a big city and probably caters to everyone in one way or another. Luckily, the **I Amsterdam** initiative has collected most of what can be experienced in Amsterdam,

- 1) Rent a bike and make a tour around the city (there are enough places to get one).
- 2) Ditch your map and take a walk around the Jordaan, you'll have a great shopping experience.
- 3) Go to Museumplein to soak up some culture. Three museums are found here.
- 4) Catch the ferry to Amsterdam-North and enjoy the beach and possibly a festival or another event.
- 5) Take a cruise on the city canals and discover the historical center. These canals are protected by the UNESCO.

Food and drinks

Just north of the tournament venue is an area with a high density of restaurants. Here you can find (amongst others) Japanese, Italian, Thai and Indonesian food places. If you want to stay close to the venue, they are most likely to have something for everyone.

In the city center you can find a lot more restaurants. Go visit the <u>I Amsterdam website</u> to find something to your liking.

Magic

Amsterdam only has one major location to play Magic, in addition to some bars and coffee shops that have frequent players. It is located to the west of the city center, north of the venue.

Buienradar

The weather in the Netherlands can be quite unstable. Leaving 10 minutes earlier or going for yet another drink can be the difference between keeping yourself dry or getting all soaked on the way. **Buienradar** is a free weather forecast app with accurate information on the weather for the near future. In the app you can check the rain for the next couple minutes (or hours) and decide when is the best time to leave. If you don't like the app, you can always use an umbrella instead!
